One of the most ardent desires of humanity is to have peace on earth. We talk about it, we sing about it, we pray about it, and it eludes us. So, when the idea to teach peace to youth groups became a strong desire for Yes We Can Peacebuilders the question arose. How do we teach peace?

We were already pretty aware that something like this was not reaching our school age children in their classrooms. Sure, they get courses in history and social studies, but a real curriculum based on teaching the principles that govern a peaceful society are missing. Kids these days have a lot to handle what with active shooter drills in school, bullying in the hallways and on the playground, and too often down right hate crimes targeting those who have different gender identities.

It's a fact that much of the real history of this country is blatantly left out of school courses. The absence of this knowledge only exacerbates the tensions young people deal with daily. Without a good understanding of where we came from, how can we expect to create a world that we would like to identify as an ecological civilization? One that champions a life-affirming society. How can we expect behaviors that emphasize compassion, understanding, and acceptance if we don't teach it? We live in a society run rampant with individual and systemic violence. While we espouse to a society and government that addresses economic injustice, better policing, gun control, effective mental health, affordable housing, health care for all, free education, pollution-free food, natural spaces, diversity, restorative justice, and one interested more in the well being of all than the monetary excesses for some, we are woefully far from attaining any of these things. Those of us who are of an age now realize that we are leaving much in the hands of the following generations, and we are doing so without much guidance.

Peacebuilders is not the first organization to be interested in teaching peace. Others have been hard at work doing this for years. So, we look to them for guidance as we approach our first foray into working with youth groups. We are fortunate in obtaining curriculums from two existing and long-time organizations that teach peace to young people. We are grateful to the Little Friends for Peace of Washington, DC and The Discovery Center for Peacebuilding in Shelburne Falls, Massachusetts. We agree with these organizations that we can imagine a world of peace. We also see peace as a way of thinking, feeling, and acting, an attitude towards self, others, and the world. We hope to cultivate peace in our hearts and let that flow out to those who thirst for it.

We will begin this fall first with a definition of peace realizing that it is not just a place where there is no noise, nor is it a country that has no bombs falling. As we sit in our Peace Circles, we will start with going inward to develop an attitude of care for oneself, to be forgiving to oneself, and to think uplifting thoughts. Then we will address caring for others, helping someone in need, listening attentively to another, and standing up for someone who is not being treated fairly. We will introduce caring for our earth as without this we cannot care for ourselves and others. It is a beginning, and we hope it extends beyond the Peace Circle to these young people's homes and classrooms. Peacemaking is journey.

New Climate Justice Affinity Group Forming

Recently a group of followers of nonviolence principles met with trainers Rivera Sun and Ken Butigan from Pace e Bene Nonviolence Service on a zoom call discussing how we might form a variety of affinity groups with people from across the country and across nations to discuss how to organize to handle the issues affecting our world today. One of the interests expressed at this meeting was climate change and more specifically, climate justice.

Karen Weber, of Santa Fe, New Mexico stepped up to the plate to be coordinator of the group and has scheduled the first zoom meeting to take place on August 27<sup>th</sup> at 10 AM Pacific Time, 11 AM Mountain Time, 12 PM Central Time, and 1 PM Eastern Time. There are some people from the international community who will be joining the group that day.

The agenda is as follows:

- 1. Opening and ground rules
- 2. Introductions where we live, what actions or issues we are involved with/interested in
- 3. Presentation what is Ecological Civilization?
- 4. Discussion what is Climate and Environmental Justice?
- 5. Discussion what do we want from the group? how do we move forward?
- 6. Discussion how often do we want to meet?
- 7. Going forward

This should be an interesting meeting where we search out the climate problems occurring in each of our specific locations and can offer what work is being done to help solve the worldwide effects of global warming.

# People of Faith Present Podcast America's Gun Problem-What Makes Us Different

There are too many guns in the United States of America! Four hundred million firearms are owned by civilians in America–400 million–more guns than the US population. Nationally, there are more than 45,000 deaths caused by guns every year; that's nearly 125 Americans per day killed by firearms. As of this year, guns are now the leading cause of death for Americans ages 1-19.

As horrifying as these statistics are, they are only a small part of the story. The real stories are told by the victims, their families, friends, teachers and all who loved them. The loss, trauma, pain, fear, and anger just keep multiplying. Legislation that would actually make a difference in gun violence and gun deaths seems elusive.

In 2022 alone, there have already been nearly 300 mass shootings–at parties, protests, rallies, in the streets, in homes, motels, malls, stores and in school rooms– even at a 4th of July parade–almost no place feels safe anymore.

People of Faith's guest on this podcast, Michelle Garner of Moms Demand Action, shared her story and her commitment to changing the forces of gun violence in the United States. Garner told how the Assault Weapons Ban of 1994 has expired making the purchase of them easier once again. California does have a ban on the purchase of assault weapons but somehow, they are still purchased. She also said that the biggest reason young people get access to guns is because of their families not securing them. Many schools, PTAs, and districts are working on information to the public as to how to safely store guns. She said that guns are the leading cause of death for children. Moms Demand Action calls for more funding for schools for counselors and training by schools to educate kids on social media so they would know when they see a red flag with an individual. San Luis Obispo schools has a way for students to report a suspicious person anonymously. She called for advanced peace and anti-violence programs working with CALVIP (California Violence Intervention and Prevention Grant Program) to obtain funding for such programs. Calls and emails to state legislature are now needed in this effort. Anyone can text to Ready64433 for help from Moms Demand Action across the country.

The local chapter of Bend The Arc helped bring the city of San Luis Obispo into compliance with California Assembly Bill 392 that states police may use deadly force only when necessary to defend themselves and they must use de-escalation techniques and crisis intervention tactics before considering more stringent actions. Bend The Arc reminds us that the police respond to crime, they don't prevent crime.

They also remind us that hope is a discipline to practice! Good advice!
